Fathering Adventures

Fathering Adventures is designed to have one man, primarily a father, grandfather, or father figure, pour into a young child's life. As I look back on my experience with Fathering Adventures Camp, I remember being in a very unique position. Both of my sons are grown men, so I decided to take my grandson, Jeremiah.

I was able to watch Jeremiah, an African American youth, interact comfortably with people who did not look like him. He had experiences being with diverse people, in school, for example, but he hadn't experienced them in a Christian environment. He had an amazing time that weekend participating in activities like the giant swing, water balloon throwing at adults (the fathers were the targets; that was a blast!), zip lining, and an unscheduled small magic show that I had a chance to perform. I believe that made Jeremiah proud, seeing his grandfather in the spotlight for a few moments.



The grand finale for me was there was a ceremony where the fathers were able to give their sons affirmation. As a grandfather I was able to look Jeremiah in the eye and tell him that God loves him and has a plan for his life, if he would just trust in Him and follow His will for his life. The experience was something I know he will never forget, and neither will I. Our young African-American boys have opportunities to go to all sorts of camps, but not a father son camp where God is to focus. My prayer is that there will be more African American fathers that may get involved with the RPM Father and Son Camp, so they can grow closer to their sons and create memories that will last a lifetime.

Many homes in our communities have broken down and a large reason for that is because so many fathers are absent from their families. This is happening in homes of all ethnicities. Many churches are not doing a very good job of discipling, leading and growing men to be the leaders with integrity that God wants them to be, both in their homes and communities. One weekend at a camp like this can cause a man to realize the awesome responsibility we have as men to influence and help our young children to grow a mature spiritually, so they can grow-up to be people of character and integrity.
